Wound care is a relatively small specialist field which is growing in momentum as more and more cases of chronic and complex wounds increase clinicians' workload. One of its complications, the diabetic foot often presents late and a structured multidisciplinary team approach is needed to manage these patients and prevent the need for amputation.

To help improve overall wound care standards, the Association of South East Asian Nations (ASEAN) Wound Council was formed last year, consisting of ten member nations. One of the highlight of this formation is the founding of the new Myanmar Wound Care Association. Its inaugural conference was held in September in Yangon, the capital of Myanmar.

This issue will be available in print at the 16th Asia Pacific Conference on Diabetic Limb Problems and the 2nd Global Wound Conference 2019 organised by the Malaysian Society of Wound Care Professionals (MSWCP) together with the Asia Pacific Association on Diabetic Limb Problems (APADLP). By combining these two conferences, we are able to welcome more than 70 speakers from more than 40 countries. The industry support has also increased and delegates can visit 56 super and normal booths and tables. It will be the premier event in Asia. The theme is 'Step by Step, Mission Accomplished'. In addition, wound management needs to be carried out with PASSION as envisioned by the MSWCP.
